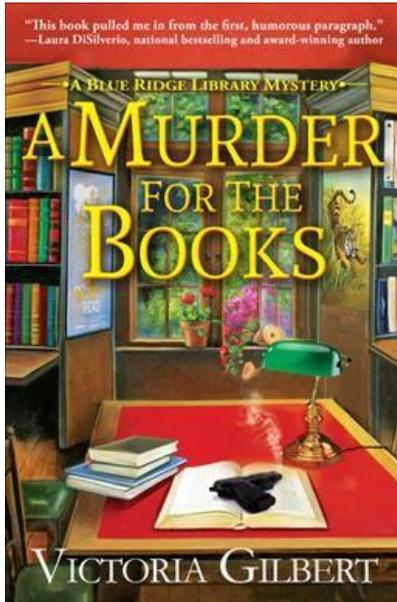

A Murder for the Books

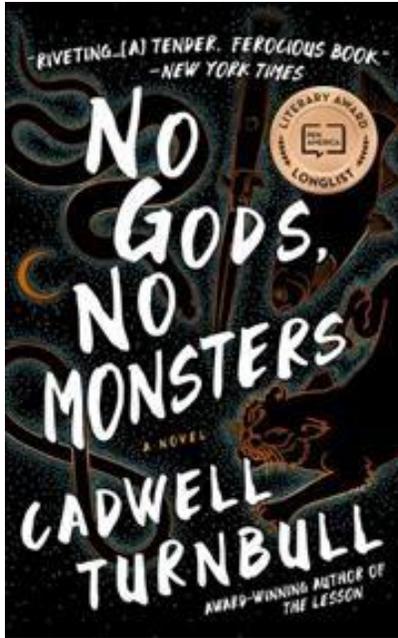
Victoria Gilbert

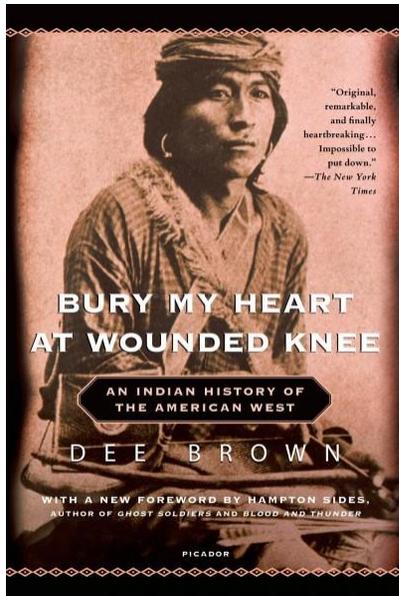

Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee: An Indian History of the American West

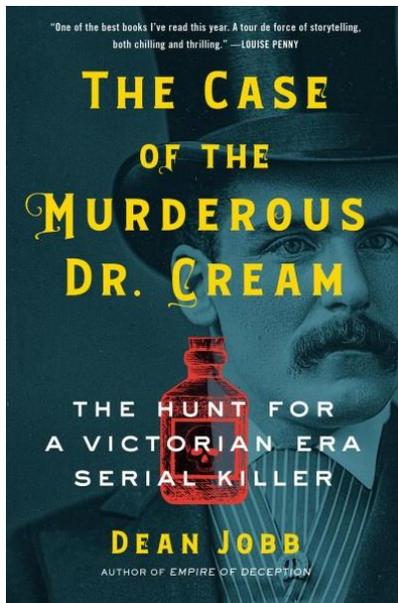

Framed around one salacious trial in 1891 London, a fascinating and vividly told true-crime narrative about the hunt for one of the first known serial killers.

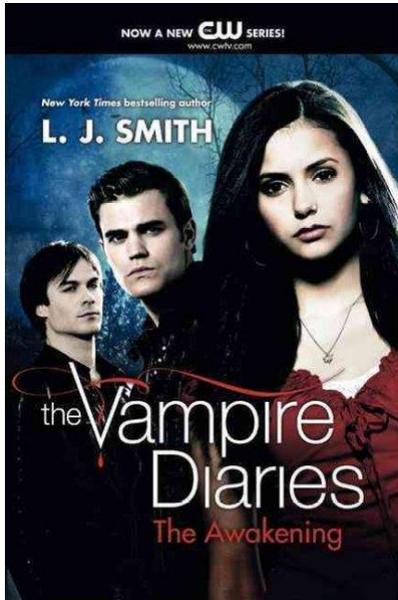

The Vampire Diaries: The Awakening

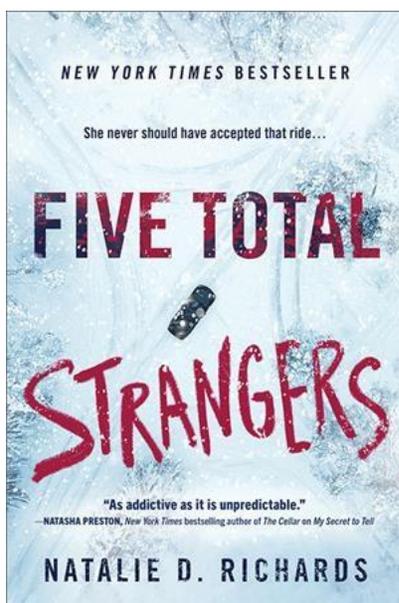

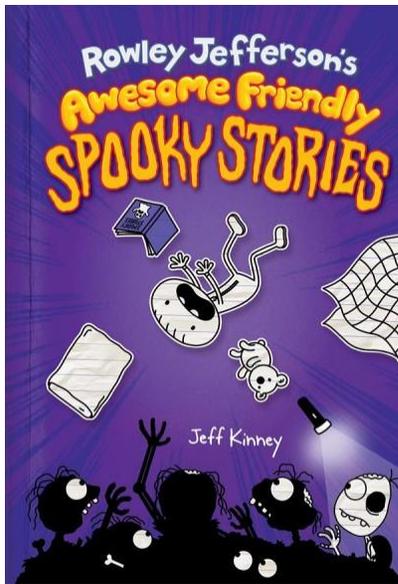
